President's Message

The End of the Year is a Beautiful Thing

Well, it's just about here: the end of the school year. You've made it, hopefully without forgetting to pick up your child from school or having a

melt-down in the principal's office. There are a few things you can do in these last few weeks of school to make a big difference without making a big effort.

First, take time to reflect on your PTA's accomplishments for the year, and publicize them. A message by email or a flier in the backpacks that lists the ways that PTA made a difference at your school this year has several benefits. It makes people feel good about their PTA membership because they know it meant something. It brings satisfaction to the leaders and volunteers who see all the organization's accomplishments listed together. And it promotes membership for next year because people want to be part of these positive programs.

Next, complete key transition tasks well so that next year will begin smoothly. Make sure the contact information for next year's board has been given to your principal, your PTA council, and to Fourth District PTA. (Enter it on our website form: www.fourthdistrictpta.org/new-officer-submission-form.) If you have ideas for ways to improve your PTA programs next year, jot them down now so they aren't forgotten by the fall.

To ensure that PTA information and resources are passed along, set a time when your board can meet with incoming board members. Provide refreshments and tables where each outgoing officer can sit down with the new officer and talk through the PTA materials.

Ideally, your officers each have a notebook or folder that contains a copy of your bylaws, budget, calendar, and information relevant to their specific jobs, such as fliers used for an event, contact information for vendors hired, etc. Even if what they have is a shoebox of stray papers, it is better off in the hands of next year's officer than in the trash. Your California State PTA *Toolkit* is the property of the PTA and needs to go to next year's president. There will not be a new one this summer.

Make sure treasurers and auditors are aware that they have specific summertime duties. The



financial books are closed as of June 30th, with the treasurer balancing the checkbook and creating a year-end financial summary. Then the <u>outgoing</u> auditor performs a thorough audit. After these tasks are completed it is time to take care of your tax forms. The outgoing treasurer is responsible for either filing the electronic forms (if the PTA budget is low enough) or hiring a tax professional. Then it is appropriate to change the signatures on the bank account and hand over the financials to the next officers.

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New requirement for submitting revised bylaws is now in effect

<u>Background</u>: All PTA units must apply for a Charitable Trust (CT) number by the end of 2012 or risk as-yet-unknown penalties. The California PTA Parliamentarian would like to be assured that units that don't already have a CT number are aware of the process, and that they have taken the first step by filling out the CT-1 form.

Beginning April 1, 2012, unit bylaws sent to California State PTA for review and signature that do not have a CT number inserted in Article XIV (Fiscal Year and Identification Numbers) must also send a copy of a filled-out CT application form (Form CT-1).

Please note that the unit does not need to have FILED for the CT yet, especially if the bylaws are being sent just to get a current version that the unit can submit with the CT application. A copy of the filled-out CT-1 form is required simply to prove that the unit is prepared to file for the number.

Please remember to use a bylaws transmittal form when submitting revised bylaws through your council parliamentarian. The form is available at www.fourthdistrictpta.org/forms under "Parliamentarian."

A grim picture of California's slide from first to worst in public education was presented by Ron Bennett, president and CEO of School Services of California, at the April 27 Roundtable.

Some of his key points:

- If school districts were funded according to state law, they would be getting \$6,742 per pupil in 2012-13. Instead, they will receive \$5,281, or the same amount they received in 2007-08, if the Governor's tax increase initiative passes. That drops to \$4,911 if the Governor's initiative fails. "Does this look like a state that has public education as a priority?"
- The highest-performing students are in the five states with the highest per pupil funding. California is among the five states with the lowest funding and the lowest student performance.
- California has lost 40,000 teachers since 2007.
- If the federal government paid the full 40% for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), it would provide enough funding to pay the annual salaries for 23,000 teachers.
- There are concerns about what will happen if *Our Children, Our Future* (OCOF) is approved and the Governor's initiative fails. If the state cuts education funding again, schools would not be able to use OCOF funds for core purposes, such as salaries. The governor and legislature might find other ways to manipulate Prop. 98, again resulting in budget cuts.
- If the Governor's proposal for a weighted student

formula passes, about 60 percent of school districts would get less funding, and 40 percent would get more, but that would come from the other districts. Districts with less than 42 percent of students on free and reduced lunch would lose millions of dollars. The only way to make the plan work is if there is new money to add to the formula.

- Assembly member Julia Brownley has a "cleaner" version of school funding reform (AB18), with no losers and no weighted student funding formula, but its future is uncertain.
- According to state law passed in 2010, the age for kindergarten admission is being shifted over several years so that children must be five years old by September 1 to begin. Senator Joe Simitian, who authored the law, hoped to use the savings for a Transitional kindergarten (TK) program. The Governor's proposed budget eliminates TK but allows school districts to admit younger students to kindergarten.
- Since 2001, the state has postponed, or deferred, making payments to school districts. To continue operating, districts have had to borrow money. The state now owes districts \$10.6 billion in deferrals. If the Governor's initiative passes, he plans to pay back \$4.8 billion in deferrals (money already spent by districts), but there will be no new funding.

Start planning now for fall candidate forums

Many school districts will hold school board elections during the general election in November.

PTA is non-partisan, and never supports or opposes candidates for public office. However, PTA should be actively involved in helping voters make informed decisions on school board candidates. Many PTAs do this by hosting candidate forums.

Election information and vote-by-mail ballots will be mailed soon after the school year starts, so if your PTA intends to sponsor a candidate forum in the fall, the time to start planning is now.

Here are some things you can do to get ready:

• Form a committee to organize the forums.

• Review the information on candidate forums in the *California State PTA Toolkit*. (Section 4.3.2)

- Identify and reserve one or more locations and dates for the forums.
- Develop a plan to publicize the events.
- Set up a timeline and assign tasks.
- Estimate costs and include them in your PTA's budget for next year.

Planning ahead will allow you to quickly and efficiently set up your candidate forums in the fall.

Arts education for a better American future

Do you need another reason to advocate for a complete curriculum for every student, including a rich arts curriculum? Creativity and other skills learned through the arts are <u>essential</u> to our economic recovery and stabilization. Several recent publications stress this connection.

The Mayor's 10 Point Plan for a Strong America (published by the US Conference of Mayors) cites the arts, humanities, and museums as critical to the quality of life and livability of America's cities, as well as being an important component in the economic revitalization of our cities.

According to the just-released New Engines Of Growth study published by the National Association of Governors, with concerns over job creation and business growth holding a prominent - and persistent - position on policy agendas today, governors are increasingly calling on state agencies to support economic growth. It's not just economic and workforce development agencies that governors want on the case. Some governors are including state arts agencies in this all -hands-on-deck approach, and are putting in place policies and programs using arts, culture, and design as a means to enhance economic growth. In particular, arts, culture, and design can assist states with economic growth because they can:

- 1. Provide a fast-growth, dynamic industry cluster;
- 2. Help mature industries become more competitive;

- 3. Provide the critical ingredients for innovative places;
- 4. Catalyze community revitalization; and
- 5. Deliver a better-prepared workforce.

The Adobe® State of Create global benchmark study included interviews of 5,000 adults across the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, France, and Japan, and exposes surprising attitudes and beliefs about creativity, providing new insights into the role of creativity in business, education, and society overall. The research shows 8 in 10 people feel that unlocking creativity is critical to economic growth, and nearly two-thirds of respondents feel creativity is valuable to society. More than half of those surveyed feel that creativity is being stifled by their education systems, and many believe

Protect kids now

Let's not wait for something to happen – let's work now on prevention of things like cyberbullying, sexual exploitation and abduction.

Some statistics:

- There are 2000 missing children reported daily. Most likely to be victimized are females aged 11 to 17 years old. Thirty-eight percent of attempted abductions occur while a child is walking alone to or from school, riding the school bus, or riding a bicycle. Thirty-seven percent happen during the hours of 2-7 p.m.
- There are 33.2 million youths who use the Internet daily. Of those, 58 percent post personal information, and 43 percent talk to unknown people online. A 2007 survey of 1,500 youth indicated that one in seven had received a sexual solicitation online.

Resources for action

There are things we can do to protect our children. We can watch for signs in their



behavior. Communication is the key to prevention. Children learn and develop awareness through repeated messages from their parents. Regular conversations create a second nature of awareness. We can work to build trust with our children and create teachable moments.

That National Center of Missing and Exploited Children has numerous materials to help you as a PTA to improve safety and empower parents and children in fighting cyberbullying, sexual exploitation, and abduction. The *Take 25* campaign focuses on taking 25 minutes to talk with children about safety. The center offers minilessons, conversation starters, safety tips, child ID kits, and presentations. See www.take25.org.

The Campaign Against Sexual Exploitation (CASE) provides free resources in numerous languages. There are educational and outreach materials, posters where you can insert your logo, and technical assistance all available for free. See www.missingkids.com.

NetSmartz workshops are available for all ages. They educate, engage, and empower. You can get free online safety kits, information on how to do a panel presentation, staff and parent training programs, brochures, and many other free materials. See the NetSmartz website at www.netsmartz.org.

creativity is taken for granted (52 percent globally, 70 percent in the United States).

"One of the myths of creativity is that very few people are really creative," said Sir Ken Robinson, Ph.D., an internationally recognized leader in the development of education, creativity, and innovation. "The truth is that everyone has great capacities, but not everyone develops them. One of the problems is that too often, our educational systems don't enable students to develop their natural creative powers. Instead, they promote uniformity and standardization. result is that we're draining people of their creative possibilities and, as this study reveals, producing a workforce that's conditioned to prioritize confor-

mity over creativity."

The California Legislative Joint Committee on the Arts is

holding hearings on legislation that will develop a "creativity index" to measure creativity in public schools statewide. This movement matches legislation passed in Massachusetts last spring, and is much like a bill working its way through the legislature in Oklahoma. Many other states are beginning similar discussions, and other cities and nations around the world are following these efforts closely.

Clearly, something big is happening across America. In a book called The Jobs Revolution: Changing How America Works, former U.S. Secretary of Education Richard Riley said, "We are currently preparing students for jobs that don't yet exist, using technologies that haven't been invented, in order to solve problems we don't even know are problems yet." It is vital that we merge the arts and sciences and, in the process, create the kind of curriculum that, at almost no additional cost, insures the higherorder thinking and problem-solving skills that will determine student success in the workplace of the future.

All of these revelations and efforts represent an auspicious start to reinventing K-12 education. And they represent new thinking about the arts and what is called "arts integration." It is simply about interdisciplinary education and using the tools of the arts across the curricula. Many people don't take the term "arts" seriously. It's soft, not muscular. But we now know a lot more about learning. and know that "arts integration" works. The California Alliance for Arts Education and the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities (PCAH) has said as much after spending years of research and study. The PCAH said, "A greater investment in the arts is an effective way to equip today's students with the skills they will need to succeed in the jobs of tomorrow."

PTA Power!


There is no better way to experience the power of PTA than to be there as over 3,000 PTA leaders converge at Convention to attend workshops and events designed to educate and empower them.

Attended the EdSource Conference. The impact of the economic and housing crises, which have resulted in increased mobility/transiency in housing and school, is affecting students who are also impacted by the reduced numbers of supporting adults on campus due to cuts to education and social ser-

vices. Children in poverty come into school behind and have a hard time catching up.

Workshops: Attended PTA & Elections, Hot Topics, and ESEA Update. Jacque Chevalier from National PTA was an extremely effective presenter with lots of energy and insight on the political process in DC.

Nuevo requerimiento para entregar los estatutos revisados entra en efecto

<u>Historial:</u> Todas la unidades de PTA deberán aplicar para un numero de fideicomiso caritativo (CT) para el final del 2012 o atenerse a las consecuencias y penalidades. La parlamentaria de la PTA de California quiere asegurarse de que las unidades que todavía no tienen dichos números al menos saben cómo es el proceso de obtención del mismo y que al menos ya hayan dado el primer paso de llenar la forma numero CT-1.

A partir del 10 de abril de 2012 los estatutos que hayan sido enviados para revisión y firma a la California PTA y que no tengan el numero CT insertado en el articulo XIV (año fiscal y número de identificación) deberán mandar una copia de la aplicación o forma CT-1.

¡Proteja a sus hijos ahora!

No esperemos a que algo pase- vamos a trabajar en prevenir cosas como la burla por internet, la explotación sexual, rapto y seguridad.

- Hay 2000 niños perdidos reportados diariamente. La mayoría son niñas entre los 11 y 17 años. 38% de dichos raptos ocurren cuando la criatura está caminando sola a la escuela o viene de regreso de ella, abordando el autobús escolar o andando en su bicicleta.
- 37% de estos raptos ocurren entre las horas de las 2-7 p.m. Hay 33.2 millones de jóvenes que usan el internet diariamente. De ellos 58% ponen información personal, 43% hablan con desconocidos en internet. En una encuesta hecha a 1500 jóvenes en 2007, uno de cada siete recibió una solicitud sexual por internet.

Recursos para prevenir

Hay varias cosas que podemos hacer para proteger a nuestros hijos. Existen señales en su conducta que pueden mantenernos alertas. La comunicación es la clave de la prevención. Los niños aprenden a través de la repetición de los mensajes. Conversaciones regulares crean una segunda naturaleza de alerta. Debemos de establecer confianza con nuestros hijos y crear momentos de aprendizaje. Por favor note que una unidad no necesita haber aplicado por su CT todavía, especialmente si los estatutos son mandados solo para obtener una versión actualizada que la unidad puede mandar con la solicitud de la aplicación. Una copia de la forma CT-1 se necesita para probar que la unidad está preparada para aplicar por dicho número.

Por favor recuerde que la forma de transmisión de los estatutos cuando se solicita la revisión de los mismos, deberá ser entregada a través del parlamentario del concilio. Dicha forma se encuentra disponible en el sitio de internet www.fourthdistrictpta.org/forms debajo de la pestaña del parlamentario.
